Churches define & claim vitality









Vitality is not about budget or size. Vital churches do not count nickels and noses. Rather they claim a holy imagination, spending time and resources on vision, mission, and building relationships in the community. Vital churches focus on where and to whom God is calling them.

Vitality is defined by four pillars (www.pdcbwc.org/church-vitality.html) and the interactions that unfold between the pillars. The four traits of vitality include:

SEEING ALL THE PEOPLE

drives us to build authentic relationships that create belonging as everyone feels known and valued as Children of God DEEPENING DISCIPLESHIP creates paths for more people to witness Jesus Christ through acts of justice, compassion, devotion, and worship under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

LIVING & LOVING LIKE JESUS moves us from the seats to the streets as we take the gospel beyond the walls of our buildings.

MULTIPLYING IMPACT

aligns our mission to God's call by listening and discerning with the broader community how we might reshape ministry and repurpose resources for the greatest good.

The leaders of the Peninsula-Delaware and Baltimore-Washington Conferences have committed to 100 percent of their churches becoming 100 percent vital as they live out Jesus' call in John 10:10 for all to have abundant life.
